Social trauma course

- **Social trauma** is a type of psychological trauma caused by events in which the behavior of one large social group leads to the traumatization of another large social group (Hamburger, 2018).
- Social trauma influences:
 - The physical and psychological health of the traumatized individual
 - The identity of the traumatized individual
 - Social environment of the traumatized individual
- Due to the complexity of its mechanisms and its wide reaching consequences and manifestations, the course covers the topic of social trauma from different areas of psychology including developmental, social and clinical psychology, covers the perception and memory related topics of social trauma and also discusses the ethical considerations and methodology of research in social trauma.
- All students who have met the conditions for passing this course specified in the summerschool general instructions will receive a certificate that they have successfully completed the Elective Course Social Trauma, with 5 credit points (ECTS).

Important notice about time zones!

As the summer school is being held online with participants each in their home country, you should be aware of time differences between countries i.e. that different participants will be in different time zones.

Bosnia-Herzegovina, Germany and Serbia use Central European Summer Time or CEST for short. Turkey and Bulgaria use the East European Summer Time or EEST for short which is +1 hours compared to CEST.

Introductory lecture – Vladimir Hedrih



Dr. Vladimir Hedrih is currently the Speaker of the STICS network and the main organizer of this year's STICS network summerschool. He is a full professor of psychology at the Department of Psychology, Faculty of Philosophy of the University of Niš. He is the editor-in-chief of the scientific journal Psihologija, which is currently the most influential scientific journal in psychology in the Balkans area, published by the Serbian Psychological Association. He is currently performing the role of the Vice Dean for International Cooperation of the faculty of Philosophy. During his career he was a part-time/visiting professor at multiple universities in Serbia and Bosnia&Herzegovina. Between 2011 and 2020 he led a Serbian national research project on the topic of work-family role relations. He publishes on a range of topics from vocational interests, career development and work-family relations to issues in psychometrics and methodology to topics in the area of social trauma (in the scope of the work of the STICS network). Aside from other publications, this year he published an international textbook on psychometrics issues of cross-cultural adaptation of psychological tests (Hedrih, V. (2020). Adapting Psychological Tests and Measurement Instruments for Cross-Cultural Research: An Introduction, 1st Edition. Routledge, Oxon, UK and New York, USA)

Keynote speaker - Phil Langer



Dr. Phil C. Langer is a professor of social psychology and social psychiatry at the International Psychoanalytic University Berlin and associated member of the Center for Transdisciplinary Gender Studies at the Humboldt-University Berlin and the Institute of Sociology of the Goethe-University Frankfurt. He is currently affiliated with the University of Vienna as a visiting professor at the Institute of Education. Dr. Langer's recent research projects include qualitative studies on youth's experiences of violence in Afghanistan and psychosocial needs of former ISIS child soldiers in Iraq as well as multimethodical intervention and evaluation studv organizational well-being of helpers working with refugees and IDPs in the Middle East. He has published on a variety of subjects, ranging from German contemporary literature and autobiographies of Shoa survivors over sexual risk behavior of gay men and aging with HIV/Aids to conceptualizations of trauma and issues related to the mentioned research projects.

Keynote speaker – Milica Tošić Radev



Milica Tošić Radev is an Assistant Professor at the Department of Psychology on Faculty of Philosophy, University of Niš. Her main research interests are particularly focused on the attachment theory and emotions in education and, generally, emotions in different aspects of development and close relations. Milica finished the basic level of following training courses in the field of Developmental psychology - Mirror interview, Adult attachment Projective Picture System, Reflective functioning training course. Milica is the principal of the Centre for Teacher Education and Professional Development at the Faculty of Philosophy Nis and member of the Association for the study, implementation and evaluation of attachment - Secure base. Also, she is a member of Editorial Board of journal Psychology and The Psychology Annual at University of Niš, Faculty of Philosophy, Niš. Milica was a member on the projects that funded by the Ministry of Education, Science and Technological Development of the Republic of Serbia and TEMPUS project SHESPSS - Strengthening higher education for social policy making and social services delivery at University of Niš, Serbia. Milica is an author of over 30 scientific papers (3 of them published in Web of Science referenced journals) and the co-author of the monograph "Fear is the worst place: A study of early trauma from the attachment theory perspective".

Keynote speaker – Vladimir Mihić



Mihić Vladimir, born on April 29th 1977 in Novi Sad, Serbia. Holds PhD in Social psychology form the Faculty of Philosophy, University of Novi Sad. Currently working as an Associate professor at his home University and teaches courses in social and political psychology, as well as psychology of intergroup relations and tolerance. Coordinator and project member of several projects dealing with social identities in multiethnic and multicultural regions, discrimination of Roma (especially Roma children) in Serbia, national and European identity. His bibliography includes a book on stereotypes and prejudices, more than 30 papers and more than 70 presentations in international and domestic conferences. He organized the first conference on Political psychology in South-Eastern Europe, held in Novi Sad in 2016. and sponsored by the International Society for Political Psychology. His main area of research are gender and ethnic prejudices and their consequences.

Keynote speaker – Damir Kapidžić



Damir Kapidžić is an Associate Professor of Comparative Politics at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Sarajevo in Bosnia and Herzegovina. He studied political science and international relations in Berlin, Potsdam and Sarajevo, and received his PhD from the University of Sarajevo. His research looks at ethnic conflict, political parties and power-sharing, as well as formal and informal processes through which democratic or authoritarian politics are institutionalized. Much of his focus is on countries in Southeast Europe, but also includes comparative perspectives from Southeast Asia, East Africa and the Middle East. He has published several journal articles (Journal of Southeast European and Black Sea Studies, Ethnopolitics, Journal of Public Affairs, and Peacebuilding, among others) and book chapters on democracy and institutions in post-conflict and multiethnic states. Recently, he co-edited the special issue Illiberal Politics in Southeast Europe (Journal of Southeast European and Black Sea Studies 20/1). At the University of Sarajevo, he is the principal investigator for the Horizon 2020 research project Contexts of Extremism in MENA and Balkan Societies. Prof. dr Annette Streeck-Fischer is director emerita of the department for clinical psychotherapy of children and adolescents at Asklepios Fachklinikum Tiefenbrunn/Göttingen; professor of clinical psychology and psychoanalysis at the International Psychoanalytic University in Berlin; training and supervising analyst (German Psychoanalytic Society); editor of the journal Praxis der Kinderpsychologie und Kinderpsychiatrie; and president of the International Society of Adolescent Psychiatry and Psychotherapy (ISAPP). Her books and main research interests focus on adolescence, violence, trauma, and maltreatment.

Okan Cem Çırakoğlu is an Assoc. Prof. in the Department of Psychology and the Director of Stress Management Applications and Research Center at Başkent University, Ankara. He has a Ph.D. from the Department of Psychological Counseling and Guidance at Middle East Technical University. His research focuses on stress, trauma, crisis management, secondary trauma, self-care strategies and performance anxiety. He has experience with special groups like earthquake and bombing survivors. He has been interested in asylum seekers and immigrants since the beginning of unrest in Syria. He is interested in well-being of refugees, asylum seekers and aid workers. He organized seminars and training for asylum seekers and aid workers who work for national and international NGOs and state institutions. He also participated in projects as coordinator and supervisor.

Keynote speaker – Andreas Hamburger



Andreas Hamburger, psychoanalyst (DPG) and psychologist. After teaching for a decade as an assistant professor at Munich University, he became a senior lecturer of psychoanalytic Psychology at Kassel University 2007-2009 and was called as a full professor of clinical psychology to the International Psychoanalytic University, Berlin in 2009. He was a research fellow at the Sigmund Freud Institute, Frankfurt since 2005, member of the Yale Videotestimony Study 2007-2018, founder and speaker of the DAAD research networks Trauma, Trust and Memory / Migration - Trauma in Transition / Social Trauma in Changing Societies since 2012. He was chair of the policy makers conference "Dreams to Nightmares - Welcoming Culture, Xenophobia and Social Trauma Along the Balkan Route" in Berlin, December Research and publications on Social Trauma, Scenic-narrative 2018. Microanalysis, film psychoanalysis and supervision. Besides many papers and books in German, his recent international books include: Psychoanalysis and Holocaust Testimony: Unwanted Memories of Social Trauma. London, New York: Routledge 2017 (Ed., with D. Laub); Trauma, Trust, and Memory: Social Trauma and Reconciliation in Psychoanalysis, Psychotherapy and Cultural Memory. London, New York: Routledge 2018 (Ed.). Social Trauma and Migration. London, New York: Routledge 2018 (Ed., with C. Hancheva, C. Hedrih, S. Ozcuremez, C. Scher, B. Stankovic, S.
